

In 1821, after nearly 400 years of Ottoman oppression, the Greeks bound together under a flag bearing the cross to fight for freedom and justice in the land which gave the world democracy. Like the revolution which took place in America 45 years earlier, Greece would embark on a journey forever linking our two countries in their struggle for freedom and independence. The Founding Fathers of the United States of America drew upon the ideals and principles forged in ancient Greece in constructing our nation. Thomas Jefferson called ancient Greece "the light which led ourselves out of Gothic darkness." All who cherish a free and democratic government are beneficiaries of Greece's legacy and thus should consider themselves Philhellenes.

Throughout history Greece and the U.S. have stood shoulder-to-shoulder to face the challenges of an ever-changing world. Greece had been allied with the United States in every major conflict of the 20th Century. The strong alliance continues into the 21st century. Greece, via NSA Souda Bay, Crete and other military capabilities, has contributed significantly to NATO and United States missions, including peacekeeping operations, in the ever-increasingly important region of the world.

In celebration of the 194th Anniversary of Greece's independence, AHEPA family chapters, districts, and our communities, are working together to promote parades across the country, to secure Proclamations from state and local government officials,

and are organizing flag-raising ceremonies at various State Capitols and City Halls. Indeed, AHEPA members worldwide promote and sustain the celebration of this historic day for all Hellenes.

I would like to thank Secretary of State John Kerry for his statement on Greece's National Day and express our gratitude to the members of Congress who took the time to commemorate Greek Independence Day with speeches on the Senate or House Floors, and in the Senate, where a resolution will pass to commemorate Greek Independence Day. Finally, I also ask Hellenes throughout the Diaspora to take a moment to acknowledge and pay their respects to those who sacrificed which allowed freedom and democracy to take root-once again-in Greece in 1821.





District 7 SPRING CONFERENCE

New Britain, CT - March 14, 2015

The membership of the District 7 AHEPA and Daughters of Penelope gathered at the St. George Greek Orthodox Church Banquet Facility in New Britain, CT on March 14, 2015. Despite the cold and rainy weather, approximately 40 AHEPANs and Daughters were in attendance. The gathering was honored by the presence of Supreme Secretary, Andrew Zachariades, Supreme Counselor, Greg Stamos, Region 4 Supreme Governor, Frank Fotis, and Maids of Athena Grand Vice President, Tria Charnas. A majority of the District 7 Lodge officers from both branches of the AHEPA family were present. A fantastic lunch and great conversation was had by all.

A summary of the Spring Conference business meeting is as follows: Greg Stamos promoted Capitol Hill Day. It was decided that D7 needs to organize a table for the Banquet at the Capitol event. John Grossomanides suggested that Greg Stamos coordinate with the District which will talk to the Chapters to determine attendance and invite their respective Representatives and Senators to the D7 table.

Jack Isaac is trying to bring attention to the plight of Christians in the Middle East by sponsoring local informational lectures at Yale University, providing the Capitol Day attendees talking points to use with their Representatives, and Supreme is reviewing what type of response is warranted. A motion was made by John Grossomanides and seconded by George Rados for the Supreme Lodge to advance this cause on behalf of District 7. An amendment to the motion was made by Demetrius Tasoulas and accepted by the originators to distribute this statement, when issued, simultaneously to all members of Congress. The motion was passed unanimously.

Brother Nick Nikas provided a presentation on membership of the Chapter, District, and National levels. A committee and a membership coordinator for District membership will be appointed by the District Governor. A report concerning the 2014 Hellenic History Tournament was given by Nick Nikas. A motion was made by Greg Stamos, seconded by George Rados and passed to accept the report and to applaud Nick Nikas for his efforts to foster education and knowledge of Hellenic history. Rick Pecka discussed the District Scholarship and passed out copies of the application to the members in attendance.

District Governor, Alex Boutsioulis gave his report starting with information about the Yankee District News (YDN). Alex and Jack have been acting as co-editors. John Melonopoulos and John Grossomanides have helped to make the YDN financially solvent by selling ads. Krystyna Kazakos is no longer working on the YDN but was a great resource to the publication over the years. The YDN has changed to a larger paper size format to save money and provide greater copy space. Terry Plumley, the St. George New Britain Church secretary, is the new publication publicist.

The Convention issue release date was discussed and moved up to make sure that information gets out in a timely fashion. The Fall Conference will be hosted by the Bridgeport Chapter October 3, 2015. The next Scholarship Dinner will be held August 16th in New London as part of a new four year rotation along with Waterbury, New Britain, and Bridgeport.

Greek Independence Day Observed at the Capitol Building

The Greek community of Connecticut met in Hartford at the State Capitol Building Hall of Flags to commemorate the 194th anniversary of Greek independence.

The program began at 4:30 PM and lasted about 1.5 hours with nearly 200 people in attendance. The Master of Ceremonies was Themis Klarides, Minority Leader of the House of Representatives. Speakers included Mr. Bakes Christos (Pelana Society), Rev. Fr. James T. Bogiatzis (St. George Greek Orthodox Church, New Britain, CT), Lt. Governor Nancy Wyman, Alex Boutsioulis (AHEPA District 7 Governor), Demetrios Giannaros (Former State Representative), and Fotis Papadimitrakopoulos (Paideia Secretary).

A presentation of a plaque and Spartan helmet statue was made by the Paideia Secretary to Governor Dannel Malloy which was accepted on his behalf by Lt. Gov. Wyman. A State Proclamation for Greek Independence Day was received by Fr. James Bogiatzis. There were traditional poetry readings by students from Hartford, Waterbury, New Britain, and Orange communities. Traditional Greek Folk Dances were performed by the UCONN Hellenic Student Association Dancers and the Pontian Society Dancers from Norwalk.

The second part of the commemoration took place at St. George Greek Orthodox Cathedral in Hartford at 7:00 PM. The Doxology was given by the following priests: Fr. George Zugravu (Hartford), Fr. James Bogiatzis (New Britain), Fr. Stephen Natsis (Retired), Fr. Charles Simones (UConn & Paideia), Fr. Ignatios Achlioptas (Bristol), and Fr. Perikles Kallis (Waterbury). This was followed by singing of the American and Greek National anthems. Remarks followed by Ilias Tomazos (Paideia President) and Fr. Charles Simones. This program was followed by a fish dinner that was enjoyed to the sounds of Leonidas Tsandiris & The Islanders by the approximately 80 people that were in attendance.





District 7 has taken the initiative to publicize the struggle of our brother Christians in the Middle East. Recently, the Pope and Patriarch have both spoken about this issue with the Pope "decrying the silence of many."

The Christians in the Middle East represent a community that has been there since the dawn of history. They were among the first to embrace Christianity, and now they are in grave danger. The rise of the so-called Islamic State or ISIS, has given fanatics the opportunity to try to eliminate the Christian community as well as others. We have seen the reports of ancient relics smashed, churches vandalized and destroyed, as well as religious leaders kidnapped, tortured, and murdered.

From a position a few years ago of 1 million strong in Iraq, the Christian community is down to a small remnant. They have been given the choice of paying exorbitant taxes, convert, leave or die. This has resulted in an exodus of biblical proportions with many fleeing to Kurdistan, Syria, or anywhere available for refuge. AHEPA stands proudly for the Rights of Man among which is the freedom of religion. We strongly condemn what is happening and in District 7 we have decided to put on a series of lectures at Yale University to educate the citizenry of the tragedy unfolding.

We thank our brothers Prof. George Syrimis of Yale, and Atty. Greg Stamos for their assistance in arranging these discussions.

The History Presentation By George A. Rados

Brother George returned from Cyprus and his unit participated in a street line-up in Athens for King Constantine's wedding to Danish princess Anna-Maria in 1963. During the last months of service, he was stationed at 3rd Army's Headquarters in Thessaloniki guarding its radio station. Brother George served longer than the normal two (2) year tour, due to political turmoil in Greece at that time.

Brother George is a member of Elpis Chapter 117, New Britain, and has served as Chapter Secretary, Chapter V.P., District Secretary, District Treasurer, Chapter President, District Hellenic Affairs Chair and then District Governor –in this chronological order. He served again as Chapter President last year and he remains as the District's Hellenic Affairs Chair.

Meantime he completed his studies in History (major) and Archaeology (minor) at New Britain's C.C.S. University. Under this capacity, he lectures at Middle and High schools of the region as well as at clubs and societies such as 'The Lions'.

Reflections of My Experience at Selma By AHEPA Executive Director Basil Mossaidis

In March 1965, I was 15 months old and living in the suburbs of Philadelphia, almost 1000 miles away from Selma, Alabama. In 2015, at the 50th Anniversary of historic Selma to Montgomery March for voting rights, I was honored to be walking the streets and on the bridge that defined the Civil Rights Movement in America. I'm proud that AHEPA was the only American Hellenic organization there.

Under the supervision and direction of AHEPA Supreme President Phillip T. Frangos, members of the American Hellenic community came together and traveled with the Archbishop of the Greek Orthodox Church of America to witness and participate at events that commemorated the 50th anniversary of the March. Past Supreme President Ike Gulas, Birmingham, Alabama, coordinated much of our movement in Alabama. Ike's father, Alec, was the first nightclub owner in Birmingham to hire African American bands to play. The designated point person to accompany Supreme President Frangos from AHEPA's national leadership, Supreme Counselor Greg Stamos, came all the way from Connecticut to join us.

On Friday March 6, AHEPA was invited as guests of the mayor of Birmingham to a private tour of the Civil Rights Institute. More than 100 members of Congress made the trip to Alabama and toured alongside us. Through our national leadership, AHEPA's progressive and community service-oriented programs that serve to strengthen our society were projected to the members of Congress. Congressman John Sarbanes (an Ahepan) took it upon himself to make sure our supreme president and Ahepans present were properly recognized. We were able to interact with the following members during lunch: U.S. Reps. John Sarbanes, MD.; John Lewis, GA.; Albio Sires, NJ.; Eliot Engel, NY.; Minority Whip Steny Hoyer, MD.; Earl Blumenauer, OR.; Gary Palmer,




AL.; Joaquin Castro, TX.; Carolyn Maloney, NY.; Eleanor Holmes Norton, D.C; Sheila Jackson-Lee, TX.; John Conyers, MI.; Al Green, TX.; Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi, CA.; Robert Aderholt, AL..; Terri Sewell, AL.; Debbie Wasserman Schultz, FL.; Sander Levin, MI.; and U.S. Senators Jeff Sessions, AL., and Senator Rob Portman, OH; to name a few.

After the tour, we crossed the street and participated at a prayer service at the historic 16th Street Baptist Church where African American community leaders shared stories of the days of struggle in the early part of the 1960s. Congressman John Lewis, Atlanta, a civil rights icon, was an original freedom fighter and shared personal moving stories of those dark days. Members of Congress sat alongside us while we were told of the importance of the movement and the history of the church itself.

During the weekend, AHEPA represented the American Hellenic community, in addition to His Eminence Archbishop Demetrios of the Greek Orthodox Church of America—the traditional "Twin Pillars" of Hellenism in America. Supreme President Frangos explained AHEPA's origin and the pivotal role the Order played to fight discrimination, hate and bigotry, largely at the hands of the Ku Klux Klan in the early 20th century. Founded in 1922 in Atlanta, AHEPA addressed the Greek-American immigrant's struggle to fully participate in American society. Moreover, AHEPA's leadership was vocal about how proud the Order, and the American Hellenic community, was when His Eminence Archbishop lakovos (an AHEPA Life Member) marched arm-in-arm and stood boldly with Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. in 1965, advocating the principles AHEPA holds true. At the Brown Chapel A.M.E. Church where national leaders came to speak on March 8, and before the march to cross the Edmund Pettus Bridge, Ambassador Andrew Young, civil rights activist and former mayor of Atlanta, stated, "Archbishop lakovos was my mentor." Ambassador Young went on to say that without the archbishop of the Greek Orthodox Church, the whole movement could have failed and that the African American community owes a debt of gratitude to the Greek Archbishop.

America is the beacon of freedom for the world, which has drawn countless to its shores seeking opportunity and a better way of life. Unfortunately, America has not been without its faults as the history we recounted in Selma attests. However, every AHEPA member can take pride in the organization's long tradition of providing support to underprivileged people. Just as our AHEPA forefathers advocated for the fundamental principles of democracy, freedom and human rights, so today does AHEPA stand ready to advocate for the fair treatment of all. And as AHEPA rapidly approaches its 100-year anniversary (which is only seven short years from now), we will be able to reflect proudly upon how AHEPA has been at the forefront on social issues and opened doors to pave Greek America's pathway into the Fabric of America.
