

connected to the Greek Community and to her Greek





### Greek Independence Day is Celebrated in Washington, D.C.

WASHINGTON, DC --

The American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association (AHEPA), the leading membership-based service association for the nation's millions of American citizens of Greek heritage and Philhellenes, and its affiliated organizations, celebrated the 197th Anniversary of Greek Independence with the American Hellenic community at a White House ceremony held March 22, 2018. President Donald J. Trump and His Eminence Archbishop Demetrios, Geron of America, provided remarks.

"We sincerely thank President Trump for hosting the event and for issuing a Proclamation that calls on the people of the United States to observe Greek Independence Day with appropriate ceremonies and activities," Supreme President Carl R. Hollister said.



"We also commend the president for: expressing his appreciation for the 'countless positive contributions' of Greek Americans to the United States and the vital role Greek American have played in maintaining the United States' strong relationship with Greece; for recognizing Greece's value as a NATO ally, especially as hosts at NSA Souda Bay; for citing 70 years of Fulbright Greece and the United States as Honored Country at the 2018 Thessaloniki International Fair; and for acknowledging the inspiration the Founding Fathers took from Hellenic principles and the ancient Greeks."

Several AHEPA family national officers attended the ceremony with Supreme President Hollister, wife, Cynthia, and daughter, Alexandra, including: Daughters of Penelope Grand President Eva Jean Fomalont, Sons of Pericles Supreme President Bill Poulos III, Maids of Athena Grand President Sophia Shakolas, Daughters of Penelope Grand Vice President Demi Thomas, Supreme Secretary George Horiates, Esq., Supreme Treasurer Jimmy Kokotas, Past Supreme President Andrew C. Zachariades, AHEPA National Housing Corporation President Angelo Kostarides, and Daughters of Penelope Executive Director Elena Saviolakis.

Hollister added, "AHEPA values the fact that representatives of the American Hellenic community have been welcome to the White House since AHEPA's meeting with President Calvin Coolidge in 1924. This recognition demonstrates that the Office of the Presidency has valued the American Hellenic community, its concerns, and its many contributions to the tapestry that is America since the time American Hellenes became organized and mobilized in the United States."

#### Welcoming 13th CCSU President Toro



### Editor's Notes by Jack Isaac

### "Greek Independence Day Thoughts"

There are moments in history when the stars seem to be perfectly aligned. Such was the case during the 45-year span from 1776 to 1821 when the American colonists, French revolutionaries, and Greeks fought against 3 powerful empires and won their freedom. It strains credulity to not see a divine hand in these David versus Goliath struggles.

My understanding of the Greek revolution had always been a purely academic one, but that changed during the visit to my wife's ancestral home of Chios in Greece. It was there that I had an epiphany regarding the revolution. I stood on the beach looking across the waters some 4 miles away to the nation of Turkey. My thoughts went back to 1821 when Chios was deciding whether to enter the revolution. They knew that the 4 miles of sea separating them from the Ottoman Empire would only ensure swift retribution. To think they could successfully revolt against one of the mightiest forces ever on the planet was unthinkable yet these farmers, sailors, merchants, and fishermen did just that. The result was a horrific devastation of the island as the Ottomans took brutal revenge.

During all the Independence Day celebrations I attended as Supreme Governor representing the order of AHEPA, my thoughts were always of the "Boys of Chios" and all the Greeks who fought to overthrow 400 years of oppression. Freedom always finds a way. Greece stands as a shining example of men and women yearning to be free.



### The struggle for Liberty Transcends Time and Place...

This year is the 197th anniversary of the Greek war for independence from a centuries-old Ottoman subjugation. The year 1821 may be long past, but, for the Greeks, it is never forgotten. For all of us steeped in American History, but wishing to comprehend the magnitude and significance of the Greek war for independence of 1821, a good place to start is the American Revolution in the year 1776. In the first paragraph of The Declaration of Independence the cause for the uprising of the American colonies is explained concisely and powerfully, and in words that are enshrined in our mind and our consciousness:

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed.

This Declaration, on July 4, 1776, legitimized the war between the first thirteen American colonies and Great Britain, which had already started on April 19, 1775. The scenario of the uprising of the American Colonies to gain Liberty and establish self-governance, was replayed in Greece, five thousand miles away and 45 year later, in 1821 and 1822. The struggle for Liberty transcends time and place. Reflecting the American Declaration of Independence is the Declaration of Independence of the Greek Nation, adopted on January 1, 1822, at the first National Congress of the Hellenes. The opening passage reads as follows:

In the name of the Holy and Indivisible Trinity, the Hellenic Nation, having lived – for 400 years - under the horrific Ottoman dynasty, and in opposition to the heavy and unparallel burden of tyranny, frees itself from it with great sacrifices, declares today legally at this National Congress, and in the presence of God and man, its political identity and independence.

The Declaration in Epidavros gave official standing and legitimized the war of the Greeks against the Turks that had actually started almost a year earlier, on March 25, 1821. On that day which is also the holy day of the Annunciation, Metropolitan Germanos, raised the banner with the cross, in the Monastery of Agia Lavra in Peloponnissos, and blessed the cause of the revolution, blessed the assembled Greek fighters, and sent them off to battle the Turks, the equivalent of the Massachusetts militia in Concord, and took effective control of the countryside.

The two declarations of independence, separated in time by 45 years, share a common theme and embrace a common belief, that a revolution against an occupying force that tramples on the rights of nations, is both just and inevitable. While the American Declaration was not a trigger for the Greek revolution, it nevertheless served as an inspiration for the enslaved Greeks. Adamantios Koraes, a Greek intellectual and evangelist of the Greek revolution, met Thomas Jefferson in 1785 in Paris. Their friendship continued through the years. Through Koraes and others, the high principles of the American war for Independence became known to the Greeks fighting for their freedom.

As the 4th of July is to the U.S., so is the 25th of March to modern Greece. These dates are, respectively, the birthdays of the two nations. I close by recalling a brief verse from a poem by Rigas Feraios, an evangelist for Greek independence; he sacrificed his life in the war of the Hellenes of 1821: "Better an hour of free life, than forty years of slavery and prison" Καλυτερα μιας ωρας ελεφθερη ζωη παρα σαραντα χρονια σκλαβια και φυλακη.

#### Salute to a Veteran— John G. Grossomanides

John G. Grossomanides, Lt. Colonel Retired U.S. Army was born in Westerly, RI and graduated Westerly High School in June 1945. With World War II going on, he was drafted in December 1945 and entered the U.S. Army as a private. After one year of service in the Army, he was discharged from the military due to downsizing.

Entering the University of Rhode Island as an accounting major in the fall of 1947, he decided to join ROTC (Reserve Officer's Training Corps). Upon graduating in 1951, he received his ROTC commission as a 2nd

Lieutenant. At that time, with the Korean War in full conflict, John once again entered the United States Army to serve his country. In July of 1951, he began his training at Quarter Master School in Fort Lee, Virginia and, upon completion, was stationed in Livorno, Italy.

USAG Livorno is located on Camp Darby, a 10-minute drive south of Pisa. Camp Darby's primary mission during the war was to logistically support combat deployments. This included war reserve storage and maintenance, including the maintenance of weapons, vehicles, and their movement for rapid reaction and crises response operations spanning the globe. He was stationed at the Quartermaster Depot for a 1½ years and was responsible for handling supplies and transport for all of Southern Europe. In 1953 with the war coming to an end, he completed his tour of duty and stayed in the US Army Reserves. While still in the Reserves, he was promoted to the rank of Captain in 1957, then to Major in 1964, and lastly to Lt. Colonel in 1970.

During his reservist active duty service, John was stationed at Fort Lee, VA, Fort Devens, MA, and Fort Leavenworth, KS. As part of his Reserve work, he was honored to be appointed the US Army Liaison Officer for the State of

Rhode Island to the United States Military Academy at West Point until his retirement 1981. As the West Point Liaison, he was responsible for going to the High Schools in Rhode Island to assist in recruiting cadets and educating high school seniors who might be interested in going to the US Military Academy.




