

More Than 287,000 Acres Has Burned in Greece in 2021 from Greek Reporter.com

The National Observatory of Athens issued a statement in regard to the magnitude of the environmental catastrophe that wildfires have caused in Greece this year. 287,049 acres of land have been burned in Greece in 2021. Due to the destruction that has already been caused in the broader area, an emergency status has been declared for certain regions in five different municipalities of the Peloponnesian peninsula: Gortynia, Megalopolis, Eastern Mani, Oechalia, and Pylos-Nestor. Hundreds of firefighters remain on high alert in the regional unit of Elis (Ilia)where the fires have currently

been put out. Also, all firefighters on the island of Evia will remain on high alert as a very high risk of fire is predicted for the island.

Additionally, 187 firefighters from Germany will start operating around Ancient Olympia in Elis on Friday to assist their Greek colleagues.

Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis explained that the government's top priority during natural disasters was to protect both human and animal life. "We were able to protect thousands of people but we lost forests and properties. It is important that we did not have casualties in the largest wildfires we have encountered in recent years."

Kokotas Opens AHEPA Emergency Relief Fund for Greece's Wildfires

Supreme President Jimmy Kokotas has called on AHEPA members to mobilize and authorized the Emergency Relief Fund to be opened in an effort to provide humanitarian assistance for the victims of Greece's wildfires. You can help by making a tax-deductible donation to the Emergency Relief Fund here: ahepa.org/donate. "The images and stories coming from Greece are terrifying," Supreme President Kokotas said. "Our thoughts and prayers are with all who have been affected by this tragedy. We are extremely grateful to Greece's first responders and to all nations that have offered support and assistance. We will stand with Greece as we did in 2007, 2018, and during other times of great need." At the Supreme Convention, AHEPA presented a donation of 159,000 Euros, funds raised following Greece's wildfires of 2018, to Evangelismos Hospital for the completion of a burn unit. In 2007, AHEPA transported 270 care packages totaling \$250,000 worth of goods and raised an additional \$250,000 in financial assistance for victims of Greece's wildfires. Salute to a Veteran ~ Peter E. Merisotis

Peter E. Merisotis was born in Manchester, NH on November 3, 1922. The son of immigrant parents, Ernest and Athena, Peter grew up in Derry, NH and moved to the Hartford CT. area as a young man. He worked briefly for Pratt & Whitney Aircraft before enlisting in the Air Force during World War II. He was a proud member of the 44th Bomb Squadron of the 8th Air Force stationed in England. He served aboard the B-24 Liberator "Shu Shu Baby" as the radio operator and top gunner. While performing one of their missions over Germany his aircraft was hit by anti-aircraft fire and was forced to crash land in Switzerland where Peter was taken prisoner and remained a Swiss Internee for almost a year.

After returning to Connecticut following the war, Peter worked in several jobs, including opening a luncheonette on State Street in Hartford, next to the State Theater, before finding his calling as a salesman. He spent most of his sales career selling baby photography. Peter was a born salesman and enjoyed selling up until his retirement at the age of 72. In 1955, Peter married the love of his life Artimis (Diana). They went on to have four boys, Michael, Christopher, Jamie and Emanuel.

Peter loved his church, St George Greek Orthodox Cathedral, and was a proud member of the St. George choir for over 25 years. He also served on the St. George parish council for many years holding the position of secretary. He was a lifelong member of AHEPA and served as President of the local Nathan Hale Chapter 58. He developed many friendships in the brotherhood and spoke of his involvement with AHEPA as his proudest honor.

Peter was a musician most of his life, playing the mandolin for almost 80 years. He would sing almost continuously to his children and grandchildren. Besides music, Peter's other love was gardening. He loved to spend his spare time in the garden and tending to his many fruit trees. Peter also served on the Democratic Town Committee in Manchester for years. Peter was a proud disabled veteran who in later life enjoyed reunions with his fellow Swiss Internees.

Upon retirement Peter and Diana moved to Palm Bay, Florida until the passing of Diana in 2002, when he moved to Tarpon Springs, FL. Eventually, Peter returned to his church and the community he loved in Hartford. He spent his final years enjoying his children and grandchildren until his passing on March 8th, 2015.

As I have been told, I have a large pair of shoes to fill and with your support I will endeavor to do my utmost to make you proud of me.



Brother Banis, an AHEPA Life Member of Chapter 171, Oakland, California, passed away peacefully on July 28, 2021.

Andrew was an active member of the Order of AHEPA for sixty years and has served in all offices on the chapter and district level and given the opportunity to serve as Supreme President of Order of AHEPA 2001-2002. He has served with personal and honor to the ORDER. The Hellenic American Professional Society of California presented "The Axion Award" for Andrew's exemplary service to his learned Profession.

During his term as Supreme President (2001-02), AHEPA undertook a fundraising campaign to provide relief in the aftermath of September 11. He also ensured that AHEPA's humanitarian relief was delivered to the people of Greece following the devastating 1999



"We are deeply saddened by the news of Brother Banis' passing," Supreme President Kokotas said. "We are indebted greatly to his life-long, 66-years of dedicated and selfless service to the Order and the community. Brother Banis will be missed greatly and will be remembered fondly by the Brotherhood, and the entire AHEPA family, for his contributions to the community. Sperie Peter Perakos and wife Natalie (Nikki) Pappas Perakos of Orange, CT,



respectively on April 5th and April 24th 2021. Both passed peacefully with loved ones at their sides.

Sperie was born in New Britain, CT, son of the late Peter G. and Julia Ladany Perakos. He was a graduate of Yale University, Pierson College Class of 1938.

While later attending Harvard Law School, he was required to return to CT to assist in the family's theater business, founded by his father. Sperie enjoyed a long

Connecticut Theatre Associates, owning and operating exhibition theatres throughout CT, MA and NJ. Sperie was a U.S. Army Veteran of WWII, serving as a Captain in Intelligence in the 448th Antiaircraft Artillery Battalion which participated in the Normandy invasion, specifically at Utah Beach. The 448th subsequently attached to the 35th Infantry Division (part of General Patton's 3rd army). The 35th Division advanced through France with many undertakings including the Battle of the Bulge. Sperie also flew in surveillance planes to assist in mapping areas where troops would be posted. Sperie's work in intelligence involved collaboration with the French Resistance and the French Free Forces. The 35th often assisted local populations and at the end of the war was in Germany for peacekeeping. Sperie received a Bronze Star and other honors for his service in WWII. Given his service for the war effort in France, he was awarded the insignia of Knight of the National Order of the Legion of Honor by the Deputy Consul General of France, Damien Laban, in October 2020.

Sperie was proud of his Alma Mater. He was a fellow of Pierson College and active with Yale University throughout his life as member of many boards. Especially worthy of note was his dedication to the Peabody Museum of Natural History; as a president, chairman and member of its Board of Associates for numerous years and as a contributor to their collections. He was also close to the Yale School of Drama often organizing initiatives and visits from leading personalities of the time such as Otto Preminger, Norman Jewison, and others. Sperie remained active as the secretary for his class of 1938.

Sperie was assisted by his wife Nikki in the production of the 1961 film "Antigone", starring Irene Papas and members of the Royal Greek Theatre. The film was acclaimed internationally. Recently, the couple chose the Film Archive of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences to be the permanent home for "Antigone".

Sperie and Nikki were devout in their faith and longtime parishioners of St. Barbara Greek Orthodox Church in Orange, CT. Nikki was a member of the Greek Orthodox Ladies Philoptochos Society, a charitable and benevolent association active in a multitude of programs. The couple were both proud of their Greek heritage. Sperie served as a past District Governor and lifetime member of the American Hellenic Progressive Association "AHEPA", an association promoting ancient Hellenic ideals such as education and philanthropy through community service and volunteerism. He was a Mason, and member of the Hiram Masonic Lodge #1 - New Haven. The couple loved life and were inseparable. They brought much love, wisdom and joy to those their lives had touched. They will be missed greatly.

Retired Appellate Court Judge, the Honorable Socrates H. Mihalakos, 88, of



Vero Beach, FL, formerly of Cheshire and Waterbury, CT, entered into the gates of heaven on Tuesday, July 6, 2021, in the comfort of his Florida home. He was the beloved husband of Joan (Montgomery) Mihalakos.

Socrates was born in Waterbury, CT on June 9, 1933, son of the late Harry and Kalliope (Kachulis) Mihalakos. Growing up in Waterbury, Socrates attended Waterbury public schools and was a graduate of Crosby High School class of 1951.

Afterwards, Socrates received his bachelor's degree from Brown University and went on to serve his country by joining the United States Air Force. During his military career, Socrates received the title of 1st Lieutenant (T) and after honorable discharge, served in the reserves.

Socrates then received his Juris Doctor from the University of Connecticut. After practicing as a lawyer in Cheshire, Socrates was appointed a Connecticut Superior Court judge in 1985, and in 2000, while serving as Chief Administrative Judge in Danbury, Socrates was honored to be elevated to Judge of the Appellate Court where he served in Hartford until his full retirement in 2019.

A man of exceptionally strong faith, Socrates loved and served both his church in Connecticut - Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church in Waterbury, and St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church in Fort Pierce, FL.

The family of Aspasia "Esther" Macris Mitchell, 88, of inseparable and united for over 60 years, died Niantic, regrets to inform everyone their beloved wife, mother, grandmother, and great-grandmother has lost her life to colon cancer after a three-year

> Born in Hartford, to Peter George and Nicholetta Kikopoulos Macris, Aspasia was the matriarch of the Mitchell family, married to her loving husband, E. Peter "Terry" Mitchell for Niantic of sixtyone years. Aspasia was the youngest of three children.

Her older brother was Father George Macris, the priest of St. Sophia Greek Orthodox Church from 1950 – 1956.

In the early 1970s Terry and Esther dedicated themselves to their and successful career as President and CEO of church and community after the birth of their son. They asked of God for his well-being and pledged to do everything in their ability to help the church thrive. Esther followed her husband into many activities at St. Sophia Hellenic Orthodox Church. She was a 30 year member of St. Sophia's Enosis Philoptochos chapter where she served as an officer. Philoptochos is the philanthropic arm of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America. She was named Chapter Philoptochos Woman of the Year in 2004. She also served Philoptochos at the national level as a member of the Executive Board, as Executive Secretary, and as chair of many committees. For her service, she was awarded the silver cross from Archbishop Dimitrios. She also served the Boston Metropolis Philoptochos as a board member and committee chairperson.

> Esther was active in many civic activities. She offered 4,000 hours of volunteer service to Lawrence + Memorial Hospital, served as President of the Women's Auxiliary, and as member of the Board of Trustees and Managers of the Lawrence and Memorial Benevolent Society. Esther served on the East Lyme Planning and Development Committee, the State of Connecticut Commission on Aging, and the Permanent Commission on Women.

> Esther was active in the Greek American Community, serving as President of the Dione chapter of the Daughters of Penelope for six terms, and as District Governor. She was named Penelopean of the Year both at the chapter and district levels. She was elected to serve as the National Advisor to the Maids of Athena for two terms.

> Esther enjoyed many activities with her family. Her love of cooking was shared with her daughters and friends. She loved to spend time in Vermont during the winters skiing and reading voraciously. She also sailed with her family for thirty years on their boat. She travelled widely in the United States and Europe and cherished her visits to family in Greece.

He leaves behind many close friends and his employees whom he considered part of the family.



George was a member of Saint Sophia Greek Orthodox Church, serving on the board and a member of AHEPA 250. An avid golfer, he was a member at Shennecossett Golf Club. An enthusiastic sports fan, particularly of the Red Sox, he especially loved watching his kids on the athletic field. He was a wonderful father to Michael and Olivia. From Little League to college, whether an AAU game in New York, or a lacrosse game in Florida, he was a fixture at every sporting event for his children. He would even go to Providence, for basketball to watch Mike as a manager on the sidelines. He was the type of dad who would visit his children at school frequently to interact with their friends and meet their families. His life revolved around Michael and Olivia and their interests.

George was larger-than-life, and would immediately endear himself to anyone and everyone he talked to. Everywhere he went, he extended his network of people that could call him their friend. Wherever we went, there was no escaping people that knew him. Once at a coffee shop in San Francisco, the owner recognized him from church. Soon there was an hour into a conversation about New London, in the middle of San Francisco. He loved his dogs dearly. He quickly made friends with the family dog, Jacoby. Right away, they became best buds who would love to share a pizza together. Some of the best times came watching the Red Sox games with Jacoby on the couch hovering, knowing there'd be food to share.



The 99th Annual AHEPA Convention in Athens, Greece by

The 99th Annual AHEPA Convention was a resounding success on many levels, most certainly, the "Parea", after the Covid-Induced hiatus, but also substantively, with the full dynamism and scope of AHEPA revealed to all. Notwithstanding the Greek governmental covid-driven constant

changes to events, AHEPA executed a wonderful gathering, with exceptional attendance, energized forums and significant events. The venues for the "marquis" events were simply spectacular, and ran the gambit of the premier locales, cultural and historic, of Athens: an honoring of the Hellenic National Armed Forces at the National War Museum: a welcome to Greece's Ambassador to the United States and the Greek President; an evening under the stars at the Stavros Niarchos Foundation Cultural Center; a final evening under the lighted Acropolis on the rooftop terrace of the Acropolis Museum, where the Mayor of Athens, amongst others, was honored; and the seminal event, the Grand Banquet, attended by 700 guests, wherein the Greek Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis and the Cypriot Prime Minister, Nicos Anastasiades, spoke glowingly about the importance of AHEPA as the voice of all Hellenes on important Hellenic and Greek-Cypriot-American geopolitical issues in the Mediterranean and Eastern Europe. The United States Ambassador to Greece, Geoffrey Pyatt, a true Phil-Hellene, was also present and honored at virtually all of the

AHEPA leadership shone brightly: Past Supreme President and President of the Board of Trustees, Nicholas Karacostas, masterfully orchestrated the Grand Banquet; and Supreme President George Horiatis sounded the right notes at every event. In particular, Supreme President Horiatis' rousing remarks on the importance of the Greek-American relationship and our continued interest in the fate of our homeland was strongly sounded, with a resounding theme of "why are we here?", literally celebrating our annual Convention in our homeland, but also symbolically, maintaining a presence and a vested interest in the Hellenic Republic.

The growing influence of the Order of AHEPA in Europe, Greece, Cyprus and throughout Europe was noteworthy, as AHEPAN Brothers from those domains were very prominent, and constantly appreciative to AHEPA for all that it does in advancing Hellenic culture and advocating Greek and Cypriot issues. My impression is that many AHEPA Brothers in the United States fall short of realizing the esteem in which the Order of Ahepa is held in the hearts and minds of the Greek and Cypriot communities, be its' building of hospitals, supporting of various relief efforts, the continued championing of Hellenic issues and the push for resolution of Cyprus reunification. Such esteem and influence was clearly noted in the various remarks throughout the Convention by and amongst others, Prime Ministers Mitsotakis and Anastasiades.

Mid-week I was honored to be the Master of Ceremony at the Athletic Luncheon before a crowd of 400 at the Grand Bretagne Hotel. The sports dignitaries that were honored and able to attend included: Cypriot Professional Tennis Player, Marcos Baghdatis, a Wimbledon finalist during his tenure, Pangiotas Giannakis, former European basketball star on the professional and national level followed by a distinguished career as the Head of the Greek National Basketball Federation and as Coach of its Olympic Team, and Tom Mazerakis, the New Yorker who has for the last two decades managed the Greek National Hellenic Baseball Team as it

attempts to qualify for the Olympic games. A highlight of the Athletic Luncheon was the honoring of the Kyriakides Family, Stelios Kyriakides' daughter Eleni and grandchildren, Maria and George Contos, on the 75th Anniversary of the iconic victory by Kyriakides at the Boston Marathon in 1946. Kyriakides' remarkable victory at the Boston Marathon, despite being out of training and emaciated due to the trials of World War II and the postwar Greek famine, brought tremendous and desperately needed attention to the Greek plight, resulting in an exceptional outpouring of attention, money and food goods shipped to Greece to address the Greek famine. Maria Contos' beautifully illustrated children's book about her Papou's significance, not only athletically but for the impact on the Greek people, was presented to all of the Luncheon recipients as a gift by Maria. The ultimate highlight of the Luncheon, however, was the awarding to Khaliah Ali, the daughter of the late Mohammed Ali, Khaliah Ali, of the AHEPA Human Rights Award; Khaliah has followed in her father's footsteps in pursuing the advancement of human and civil rights and equality, and was eloquent in thanking the Order of AHEPA for the touching recognition of her father and herself. There were also significant forums on Greek, Cypriot and Israeli trilateral relations in the Eastern Mediterranean, on the ongoing Cyprus reunification efforts, and on Cooley's Anemia, amongst others.

Brother Jimmy Kokotas, from New York, was elected Supreme President. I expect that Jimmy will be a real asset to the brotherhood as he is a wonderfully humane Brother committed to AHEPAs missions, and a friend of Yankee District #7. The only challenge was for the Vice-Presidency, where current Supreme Counselor Lou Atsaves was elected Supreme Vice-President in a contest with Brother Lou Katsos of New York City. Both Brothers, however, conducted themselves with class and dignity and have bright futures in our Brotherhood.

Most of all, however, a sense that permeated the Convention that all had survived these difficult months of Covid; the ability to physically be with our Brothers and Sisters from throughout the country was invigorating and needed, and that this 99th Convention returning to Athens, after a hiatus of 13 years, was a reaffirmation of our Brotherhood's commitment to our ancestral home and heritage and a needed show of confidence in Greece as it navigates itself throughout these difficult economic and social times. The 99th Annual Convention also served as a wonderful springboard to our Centennial Celebration to be held next July in Orlando.

This year's July marks over 47 years anniversary of the illegal invasion and occupation of the Republic of Cyprus by the Republic of Turkey, a NATO-member country. This was, and remains to this very day, an intolerable act; one that is a gross violation of the rule of law, human rights, and democratic ideals. We pause to remember the innocent civilians who lost their lives and the individuals who went missing. The illegal invasion and occupation caused the displacement of 170,000 Greek Cypriot refugees who to this day are unable to return to their homes which is also a violation of human rights as determined by the European Commission on Human Rights. Moreover, Turkey's restrictions upon religious freedom and destruction of Cyprus' cultural and religious heritage in Turkish-occupied Cyprus have been well-

documented by the U.S. Helsinki Commission, the Law Library of Congress, the U.S. Commission on International Religious Freedom, and several media publications.

Today, over 45,000 Turkish troops and thousands of fanatic Islamic nationalistic Turkey residents implanted on the island of Cyprus from mainland Turkey occupy the Northern part of Cyprus with plans to colonize the island. Even worse, these days Turkey is establishing naval and drone bases in Cyprus so that it controls the Eastern Mediterranean presenting a real threat to all peaceful Mediterranean nations who respect democracy, religious freedom, and independence. Recently Turkey's genocide of the Armenian people was recognized in the USA. Recently the USA added Turkey in the list of nations recruiting underage young people to be sent as mercenaries in the middle east and Africa. Turkey is taking down everything of Greek origin in the northern occupied Cyprus while the West is watching in confusion as to what to do with a so called "ally" in NATO which has turned into a fanatic Islamic militant regime.

- No great nation of this world has decisively denounced the Turkish invasion in Cyprus
- Many unanswered questions still remain about the Greek Cypriots prisoners of war who "disappeared" and "no one knows what happened to them"

- No price was paid by Turkey for the crimes it committed


Let us pray and never forget ...

AHEPA 245, Newport News by A. Stefanopoulos




